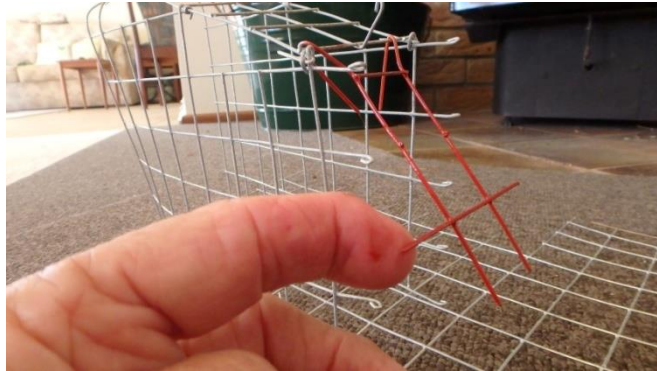
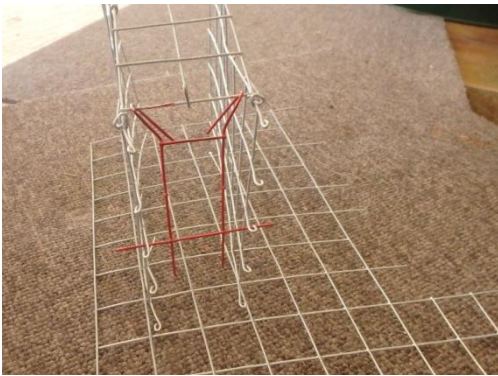


Swing doors to prevent clever mynas escaping

We have included a pair of one-way swing doors; **you may never need to use** them but occasionally we come across Indian Mynas that figure out how to walk in, have a feed and crouch down to escape from the feeding section. (The wire is not red; we coloured them so you could better see how they are fitted).

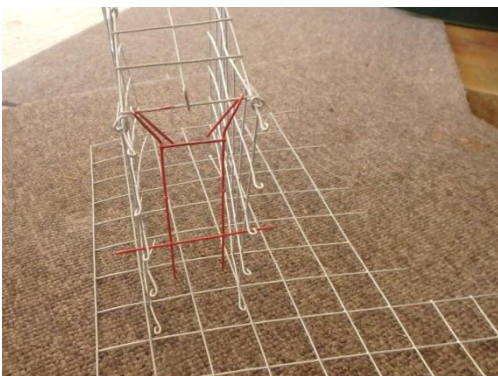
If you do come across this problem, simply hook them over the inner ends of the entry tunnels as shown, check they swing freely and don't hook up on the rolled spikes and then your clever bird should no longer be able to escape. Swing doors are not normally fitted as it may discourage some birds entering but are included should you need them.



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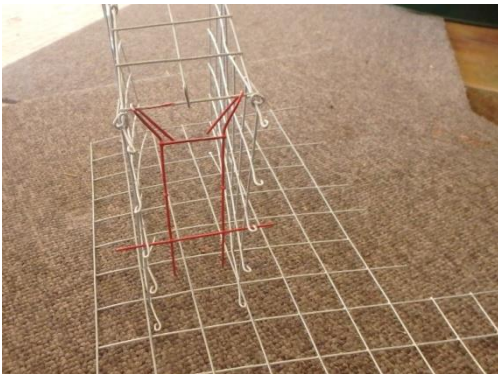
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
